GoLD Mentorship Programme



A mentorship programme is available for a new landscape designer to shadow an existing and established designer in the field. The process is a sharing of information to a new designer and to help them learn the ropes in the Industry.

FAQ's on Mentorships

1. Who can apply for a mentorship?

Any students who have qualified and have received their City & Guilds qualifications. Students need to be paid members of LGDA.

2. Where do you apply?

Contact the College for more information.

3. How long is the mentorship?

Normally a 4 week process but this can be flexible.

4. Do you get paid?

No. As the landscaper is sharing information with you that they have learnt over the years you will unfortunately not be paid. There are no reimbursements for doing a mentorship.

5. Will I be asked to physically help in installations?

Yes.

6. Will this be hard and difficult?

Yes

7. Will I learn anything?

As with anything what you put into is what you will take out of it.

Pointers to students doing mentorships:

- This is a great opportunity to learn from a designer who has learnt lots of the pit falls over the years. Do not abuse it.
- Absorb all the information that you can get in the period.
- Be grateful that someone is so open to allowing you to see the workings of their business and to share confidential information with you. This rarely happens in other Industries.
- Any confidential information that you have access to during the mentorship may not be discussed or used outside of the company that you are doing the mentorship with.
- The mentor reserves the right to restrict access to certain areas of their business.
- Build a strong relationship with your mentor they could be your best asset for your own business.
- Ask questions the information will not be handed to you on a tray. You will need to prompt your mentor as to the information that you require.
- Do not interfere in the running of the mentors business.
- Stick to company times when during the mentorship. Abide by all company rules and regulations.
- Remember that the mentor is not liable for any damages to you or your private property during the mentorship period. Mentor will also not take any responsibility for your actions.
- Remember that you are there to learn and it is a privilege.
- Do the right thing at the end of your mentorship and email a thank you letter and or give a small gift to the mentor, plants or gift vouchers always work well.
